A Message from Father George

Father George Dokos, Proistamenos

"When Joseph had taken the body of Jesus, he wrapped it in a clean linen cloth, and buried it in a new tomb." —Matthew 27:59-60

Burial and respect for our dead. That is what I would like to speak about in this month's article. From time immemorial, Christians – and their Jewish predecessors - have always taken great care to bury their deceased loved ones with honor and respect. Going all the way back to the story of Abraham and Sarah in the Holy Scriptures, it was a directive from God Himself that a person was to be buried, as He had first said to Adam: "Earth you are, and to earth shall you return" (Genesis 3:19). The Lord spoke to Abraham saying: "As for yourself, you shall go to your fathers in peace; you shall be buried in a good old age" (Genesis 15:15). For this reason, Abraham took great pains to acquire land – not for a home or for a farm – but in order to have a place of burial for himself and his family. Before Abraham himself died, Sarah passed away, and what did Abraham do? "After this, Abraham buried Sarah his wife" (Genesis 23:19). And when Abraham fell asleep in the Lord, his sons continued the divine custom, as we are told: "Isaac and Ishmael his sons buried him. There Abraham was buried, with Sarah his wife" (Genesis 25:9-10). And the list goes on and on: Isaac, Rebecca, Jacob, Rachel, Joseph, Aaron, Miriam, Moses, Samuel, David, Solomon, John the Baptist, the Virgin Mary, and, of course, our Lord Himself; all were buried with dignity according to God's will.

Where do we see any of the Old Testament Righteous or New Testament Saints ever being cremated? Absolutely nowhere. Sure, in the lives of the Saints we might encounter a holy man or woman burned at the stake or thrown into a fiery furnace, but it certainly wasn't their loved ones doing this to them. They may have suffered martyrdom in the flames at the hands of pagans, but every effort was made thereafter by the onlooking Christians to bury the body of the martyr, to preserve the remains as holy relics, and even to erect churches over the very sites of their burial. On the contrary, the Scriptures teach us that in order to disgrace someone, that person was either

left unburied, had his bones burned, or the bones were scattered about all over the place (not unlike what so many people do today by having their ashes thrown to the wind).

"But my loved one told me to cremate him/her. It's in his/her will."
And? Should you follow their wishes even though they contradict Christ and the faith? Even though this

decision will cost them an Orthodox funeral? Even though no memorial or *kollyva* can ever be offered for them? "Whoever loves father or mother or son or daughter more than Me is not worthy of Me," said the Lord Jesus (Matthew 10:37). We must seriously consider whether or not God and His commandments are first in our life and if we indeed love Him above all else with all our heart, soul, and strength, as the First and Great Commandment instructs us.

The fact of the matter is, brothers and sisters, the ancient and venerable tradition of our Holy Orthodox Church (a tradition not of men, but of God) is to offer our loved ones the proper Funeral Service of the Church and then honorably and respectfully bury them in a place of rest until the General Resurrection, when that very body will be raised from the grave and reunited with its soul to stand before the Judgment Seat of Christ. Everything we do is to affirm our belief in the dignity of the human person and the resurrection of the body, and Christian burial is intrinsically bound up with that fundamental and dogmatic belief. It should come as no surprise that the so-called philosophers of the Enlightenment and the movement's followers willfully had their bodies cremated. Why? In order to make a statement against their belief in the resurrection. Hence, the anti-Christian practice of cremation and a denial of the resurrection of the body go hand in hand, while the Christian custom and good work of burying the dead goes hand in hand with our fundamental belief in the resurrection and glorification of the body. This is the faith of the Apostles; this is the faith of the Fathers; this is the faith of the Orthodox; this is the faith that has established the universe.



In the Bookstore

Being in the liturgical season during which we witness most clearly Christ loving his enemies, we are invited to see, ponder, and know what loving an enemy is and means for every person. Loving Our Enemies: Reflections on the Hardest Commandment by Jim Forest is a book to help and encourage us in this process.

Defining the key terms in his book, the author writes:

As used in the Bible, love has first of all to do with action and responsibility, not about your emotions or liking someone. To love is to do what you can to provide for the well-being of another whether you like that person or not.... An act of love may be animated by a sense of gratitude and delight in someone else—wonderful when it happens—or it may be done despite exhaustion, depression, fear, aversion, or anger; it may be done simply as an obedient response to Christ's teaching; it may be done as a prayer and a response to God who is our common creator, who links us all, in whose image each of us is made, in whom we are brothers and sisters, who has bound together love of God with love of neighbor.

An enemy is anyone I feel threatened by and seek to defend myself against. An enemy is a person or group of people whose defeat I would count a victory. What for them would be bad news for me would be good news.... Enemies can be divided into two broad categories, those nearby and those far away—those known by name and those who are strangers.

The biblical meaning of reconciliation has to do with relationships transformed in the peace of God. The current of reconciliation is love, without which the healing of damaged relationships is impossible. (14, 18, 15)

Including narratives of what loving one's enemies looks like lived out, Forest provides the reader opportunities to grow in awareness of and appreciation for the process and to think about problems as opportunities for growth in faith and trust as well as courage and commitment. It is a brilliant book while also being a rather earthy read

because loving one's enemies is often not a neat and tidy process, nor is it a "once and done" project. Rather, it is a lifelong journey in which we walk with Christ and learn from him, being guided by him and his example every step of the way. "Our basic unity, existing beneath all divisions, has to do with each of us being bearers of the divine image.... [B]eneath our separateness is our unity. It's about the "our" in "Our Father." (16, 21)

Jim Forest not only shows what loving one's enemies looks like; he also reflects in depth on nine disciplines of active love: praying for enemies, doing good to enemies, turning the other cheek, forgiveness, breaking down the dividing wall of enmity, refusing to take an eye for an eye, seeking nonviolent alternatives, practicing holy disobedience (Mother Maria Skobtsova is featured for this), and recognizing Jesus in others. He concludes:

Our acts of love and failures to love continue to cast ripples until the end of time. What Adam and Eve did, what Moses did, what Herod did, what Pilate did, what the Apostles did, what Caesar Augustus did, what Hitler did, what Martin Luther King did, what Dorothy Day did, what you and I have done and left undone continue to matter and have consequences, for the better or the worse, for the rest of time. (165)
