A Message from Father John

Father John Kostas

'To you has been given the secret of the Kingdom of God' Some Themes of Christ's Parables

A lifetime of study would not suffice to exhaust the riches of the parables of Jesus. But some themes do stand out from the start. The parables are held together by one important goal: to make plain the spiritual power of the Kingdom of God with examples from our earthly existence. Here some themes in a nutshell.

- The Kingdom of God is hidden: The secret growth of the kingdom is not always clear to us, but we should always be looking for its blessings.
- The Kingdom of God is full of grace: God is gracious in seeking and saving the lost. But His grace is often expressed in ways so surprising that they make us think twice. And there are lessons here that should direct our behavior toward others.
- The Kingdom of God requires wisdom: 'Be wise as serpents and innocent as doves,' said Our Lord (Matthew 10:16). What are the indications that we are using sound judgment in seeking the Kingdom of God?
- The Kingdom of God contains warnings: The opposite of the wise seeker of the Kingdom is what the Scriptures call 'the fool,' a character who is condemned for not discerning the true nature of the times. They present us with examples of what to avoid.
- The Kingdom of God has need for persistence: 'Ask, and it will be given you; search, and you will find; knock, and the door will be opened for you' (Matthew 7:7). These are inspiring words from the Lord's Sermon on the Mount. But do they inspire us to be steadfast in faith, hope and love during times of suffering or trial?

You will want to keep your Bible close at hand as you examine the parables. May the Lord grant us the wisdom and character to follow them.

Welcome Back to St. Mary's!

Below are excerpts from the webinar "Getting Parishioners Back to Church" developed by Steve Tibbs, Metropolis of San Francisco. Father Jim Kordaris, Director of Evangelism and Outreach for the Archdiocese, offered this webinar to parishes in the Northeast and to St. Mary's:

Research from Barna and Gallup polls, presented by Steve Tibbs, show these key points that people like most when they attend worship services:

- 1. Taking communion
- 2. Socializing before and after services.
- 3. Listening to a live sermon

Post-pandemic, one key observed item is that the "Largest groups that have not returned to in-person worship are families with children, marginal orthodox and ministry volunteers."

But there is much good news. The parishioners of St. Mary's Greek Orthodox Church are ready to greet us with a warm welcome, "how are you doing?" "It is good to see you." Also, are you reaching out to invite someone to come back to Liturgy?

In the Bookstore

Those who attended the memorial weekend (May 15-16) for Father Anthony Coniaris — St. Mary's beloved Father A— were privileged to hear eulogies and stories about Father Anthony that revealed the depth and breadth of his devotion to Christ and the ministry he was given, accepted so graciously, and fulfilled so beautifully. His superb and inspiring preaching spread far beyond

St. Mary's after a parishioner encouraged him to publish his sermons, the seed that became Light and Life Publishing. Many of his books, especially the early ones, are thematic collections of his sermons.

Sometime around 1980, Father Anthony suggested to the members of St. Mary's that they sponsor what came to be known as the Saint John Chrysostom Lectures on Preaching at Holy Cross Greek Orthodox School of Theology and Hellenic College. N. Michael Vaporis, then Dean of Hellenic College, wrote:

Father Anthony Coniaris,...an outstanding preacher of deep faith, and a prolific author, was invited to give the third annual Saint Chrysostom Lectures on Preaching. In place of the three lectures given at Holy Cross, Father Coniaris generously offered Holy Cross Press an entire volume entitled: *Preaching the Word of God.* Although directed primarily to those who preach or wish to preach the Word of God, [this book] offers much more in terms of spiritual nourishment to all Christians. It is in fact a book that can be read with great profit by everyone interested in a living faith. (9-10)

Reading Preaching the Word of God is like seeing the framework of a building—the foundation and structure Father Anthony used and on which he built his sermons and life of ministry. He has five overarching chapters in this book: "The Priority of Preaching," "The Content of Our Preaching," "Preparing the Sermon," "Crafting the Sermon," and "Delivering the Sermon." Within this structure we see his method and priorities by subtitles such as "Improve the Feed," "Be Positive," "Preach the Cure," "Know Those to Whom You Preach," "Know God's Word," "Prepare by Reading," "Hold on to What You Read," "The All-Important Question: How?," "Define Your Terms," "Preach with Love," and "Preach with Enthusiasm."

The reader can see Father Anthony's thinking in and and through his words. For example, on being positive, he writes:

It is far more effective if we are positive in the way we present the content of our preaching....People are at-

tracted to goodness and are inspired to live up to great examples of virtue and holiness. A well painted word picture, parable, or life story of how one saint acted in a particular situation will get more results than the crack of a whip or the constant use of you 'must' do this or that. (47-48)

Throughout the book Father Anthony includes anecdotes, examples, and relevant quotes to enhance and clarify the subject on which he is writing. He also sprinkles in some humor to make an apt point lightly, such as:

A priest's sermon concerned the relationship between fact and faith. "That you are sitting before me in this church," he said, "is fact. That I am standing here speaking from the pulpit is fact. But it is only faith that makes me believe anyone is listening." (75)

Listening is vital in Father Anthony's thinking and in the asceticism and discipline he lived. He offers the reader glimpses and insights into his mind and heart:

One of the secrets of good preaching is the amount of time we are willing to dedicate to it. One must learn to spend three or four mornings a week at a place where one can be reached only in cases of emergency and where one can do nothing but study, pray and write. The priest who will resolutely keep his morning hours segregated from invasion will find his whole ministry enriched, deepened and energized. I have chosen the morning hours in my ministry because they are the clearest and freest hours....The discipline of reserving certain hours each day for the preparation of yourself and your message will impose an excellent order on your schedule and will help establish a real priority in your daily life. (66)

Preaching comes out of the preacher's relationship with God, and his preaching reflects this relationship. To communicate the Gospel, those who do it have to be people of prayer. One must so bathe himself and his message in prayer that the actual delivery of the sermon is praise to God; and when at last it is time for closing, the concluding prayer will flow naturally out of the preaching. (67)

Father Anthony's sermons truly touched the minds and hearts of those who listened to him. Preaching the Word of God embodies the accessibility of his wisdom, offering something to every reader. Father Anthony would likely point out that the life we live is the sermon we preach. With this encouragement in mind, this book is a great guide for any reader, lay or ordained.


