A Message from Father George

Father George Dokos, Proistamenos

Beholding the star leading to God, the Magi followed its brightness; and holding it as a lantern, they searched for the powerful King, and reaching the Unreachable, they rejoiced and cried to Him:

Alleluia.



Beloved brothers and sisters in Christ,

From the time of Adam's disobedience and man's fall from his communion with God, humanity drifted far from the Divine and lost its way. Nevertheless, a distant memory remained in him, a certain longing for... something; something beyond himself. This fact is illustrated in one of St. Paul's speeches recorded in the Acts of the Apostles.

As the great Apostle was making his way through the city of Athens around the year 50 AD, he came to a place known as the Areopagus, very near the Acropolis. There he said to those gathered:

"Men of Athens, I perceive that in every way you are very religious. For as I passed along, and observed the objects of your worship, I found also an altar with this inscription: 'To an unknown god.' What therefore you worship as unknown, this I proclaim to you" (Acts 17:22-23).

Appealing to the Athenians' consciences and inner longing for that unknown god, St. Paul goes on to tell them that this desire to know the true God has been implanted in every human being, as St. Paul even quotes the ancient philosophers who were searching for the truth while yet in the darkness of ignorance, for God had created men in order "that they should seek God, in the hope that they might grope after Him and find Him. Yet He is not far from each one of us, for 'In Him we live and move and have our being' (Epimenides the Cretan); as even some of your poets have said, 'For we are indeed His offspring' (Aratus the Stoic)" (Acts 17:27-28).

One can see from this that even the ancients, such as Plato, Epimenides, Aratus, and son on, were literally groping in the dark, as it were, in search of the Creator and Fashioner of all things. And the hymn quoted above from the Akathist to the Theotokos paints a picture of the Magi, pagan philosophers from the East, being guided from darkness to light, from ignorance to knowledge, from hopelessness to hope, from meaninglessness to purpose, by using the Star of Bethlehem as a guiding lantern. At last, "reaching the Unreachable,"

that is, beholding in the flesh the Word of God "through Whom all things were made" (John 1:3), they rejoiced and cried aloud: Alleluia!!

As I write this final message to you, beloved, my heart's desire is that you might cherish like nothing else in the universe the knowledge of the truth that has been given to you, that has been revealed to you: the knowledge of Jesus Christ as the Savior of the world; your Savior. The unknown and unreachable god that humanity could neither comprehend nor reach on its own merits has come to us and made Himself known, and this unfathomable gift has been given to you and me.

As we approach Christmas – the Birth of the Son of God in time and through the holy Virgin – let us give thanks for what God has given us in Jesus Christ: the remission of our sins, victory over the devil, and the promise of everlasting life. And let us acknowledge that there is nothing we can ever do to repay God for His infinite blessings, but we can at least glorify His holy Name by our every word and action, love Him above all else, and love our neighbor as ourselves. Let us also humbly pray the following, again from the Akathist:

"Unsuccessful is every hymn that attempts to pay honor to the multitude of Your mercies. For even if we offer You songs in number equal to the sands, O holy King, yet we do nothing worthy of what You have given us who cry to You: Alleluia."

May the divine grace and rich blessings of the Coming of the Savior at Christmas be with you and yours.

Iconography Classes



Saint George Greek Orthodox Church in St. Paul is hosting session 1 icon class taught by Debra Korluka which will serve the purpose of an introductory study of icon painting technique along with theological and spiritual study of icons. Partic-

ipants will learn how to paint the icon of the Holy Face.

The Holy Face, the Church's first icon is significant for iconography because the Word of God took flesh in Christ and became part of the material world. Christ Himself gave us His image, His Face, on the cloth for the King of

Edessa. It is why we can make images that represent Him. The coursework is divided into individual steps; the instructor explains the principles and then demonstrates each phase in detail, answering all questions. The course begins with drawing the icon on a prepared panel. Next, local colors within the painting are applied to the panel. Shadows and highlights are developed in the forms of the face and clothing. Painted highlights are finally applied to the painting. Additional educational materials will be

provided by the instructor during class

This session meets for four sessions: Tuesdays, January 11, 18, 25, and February 8 from 6:00-9:00 p.m.

The fee is \$245 (\$145 for tuition plus required kit of materials approx. \$100 provided by Wet Paint) Icon Painting Kit includes acrylic paint, brushes and cradled panel)

About the Instructor

Debra Korluka is an internationally renowned artist and Byzantine iconographer. She was the first American to exhibit in the former Soviet Union and has studied with icon masters from the Ukraine and Russia. Her work, which is displayed in museums around the world, has been commissioned by churches and private collectors nationally and internationally. About Orthodox Icons

The word, icon, can be found in many cultures in contemporary society. The computer industry most likely never knew how much they would contribute to the familiarity of the word "icon" when choosing the word to represent symbols that would reveal magnitudes of information via the technical world.

For centuries, holy icons have been handed down to Christians as a "sacred doorway" into the spiritual world.

Icons have been inseparable in the function of liturgy in the Eastern Orthodox Church since the sixth century. These religious icons denote the same idea as a computer icon; they offer information. The primary purpose of a holy icon is to enable a face-to-face encounter with a holy person or make present a sacred event. Icons communicate Christian Truth in a visual form. Narrative icons are images corresponding to the written Bible, portrait icons reveal information in regards to the virtues that we try to observe and remember in the holy person being depicted. We as onlookers are asked to enter into the living presence and power of the holiness being depicted and into the celebration of the sacred event.

The art form in a Holy icon is intended to be an abstraction producing a spiritual art, which recurs in the painting of icons in any generation or country, always remaining constant, consistent and prescribed by canon rule. It is for this reason that icons convey an art purely idealistic, and not meant to be realistic.


Order Your New Year's Day Vasilopita

Saint Mary's Stewardship Testimonial

Parishioner, William Buss, shared the following <u>powerful</u> testimonial with us on Sunday, October 24, 2021, following the Liturgy:

Good morning. My name is William Buss. I am 13 years old and have been a member of this parish for nine years. I was asked to speak to you this morning on the subject of stewardship and what it means to me.

I first want to say that stewardship is taking care of what God has given us. It is giving our first fruits, talents, and gifts back to God. God is always willing to accept our best if we mean it from the heart.

Jesus does not always ask us to give money. There are many ways to give. We can use our time to pray for the needs of our world and the needs of the people. We can use our talent for service and our money through almsgiving. Regardless of which contributions we make, we must also give our love, devotion, joy, charity, and kindness. These virtues help those who are in need to regain a new hope.

When I consider what to give, I try to remember the story of the poor widow who gave out of what she herself needed, compared to those who gave donations of large sums out of their excess. Although her contribution was small, it had more meaning. It was more sincere and from the heart.

I want us to not just think of money. An experience when I shared my time was when I went to Feed My Starving Children to help hungry and needy kids turn into healthy boys and girls who now have a hope of reaching their potential. It was valuable for me because I realized that we can only understand our own calling when we understand the people around us.

Building our own virtues does not come easily. Sometimes I don't want to give away my time. Other times, I want to save my money for myself. But I do it to give God what he rightfully deserves and to get a better understanding of myself and others. When I think about it, God allows me to see MYSELF more clearly through the way I want to spend my time, talent, and treasure.

Sometimes I wonder what will happen to the money that I contribute from my savings. Will it be used to help people? Will the homeless person I gave it to buy illegal drugs with it? I try not to judge others through words or thoughts. The great missionary, Mother Theresa of Calcutta, said "if you judge others, you will not have time to love them."

Through our stewardship, we can help others, but also help ourselves to focus on increasing virtues like generosity, kindness, gratitude, and compassion. These virtues are not developed if we only try them once in a while. It takes practice to form a habit. Do not be afraid to practice acts of mercy as often as you can. Whether through prayer, offering your service, or giving your money, try to feed the hungry, give drink to the thirsty, shelter the homeless, bury the dead, visit those in prison, care for the sick, clothe the naked.

I want to give, not only with the mind, but with the heart. I want to avoid giving out of pride, like the Pharisees. I want to be able to give freely with generosity and stewardship, as Christ would. As a member of St. Mary's Greek Orthodox Church, I would like to say that our church is pretty good at generosity and stewardship. I feel that I have been taught well by your example. The question for all of us is whether we will remain true to the faith. We have to continue growing.

When you give, don't just think of a physical award or prize, but an eternal one. Strive for the fullness of humility. There is no need to give a lot in order to claim you are a steward. You can give small amounts until it grows into something great. Even the smallest prayer can save a soul. The important thing is to practice, every day if you can, acts of generosity, kindness, and mercy.

Stewardship Committee Update

The Stewardship Committee has been busy this year making progress on our goals. Here are highlights shared at the October 24th General Assembly:

- Stewardship giving has continued to be strong in both
 2020 and 2021, despite the COVID-19 pandemic impact.
- Improving in-reach and engagement continues to be a focus.
 - o Young adult engagement continues to be a priority.

 The Committee met with the Parish Council to discuss strategies for improving young adult engagement and will be conducting focus groups with young adults as a next step. The purpose of the focus groups will be to request feedback from young adult members on strategies for increasing engagement.
 - o <u>The Parish Picnic</u> in August was a huge success and was a joint effort of the Stewardship Committee and Parish Council. Parishioners enjoyed coming together again for fellowship after so many months of virtual events and social distancing.

- o The "Parea" small group potluck gatherings originally planned for 2021 have been postponed until 2022 due to the impact of COVID-19 this year. The intent of these small group gatherings is to encourage members to connect with parishioners they may not know very well and to continue to build our church community.
 - "Parea" is the Greek word for a group of friends who regularly gather to share their experience about life, their philosophies, values, and ideas.

Enhancing digital approaches to giving and communications has been a goal for the past couple of years.

- o The Stewardship Committee has been working jointly with the Technology Committee and Parish Council to improve the website, enhance communications, and make giving to the church easier.
- o Website redesign was recently completed with an updated look and updated content.
- VENMO was implemented as an option for on-line giving, making it easier for members to make contributions to St. Mary's from anywhere.
- o Several volunteers contributed their time and talent on these projects, including Kathy Boosalis, Paul Hastings, Cooper Buss, Jessica Buss, and Mike Rakes.
- o We also have a goal of expanding the use of social media for engagement of parishioners. This is a critical strategy for reaching our younger members.
- The <u>Appreciation Glendi</u> took place on November 13.

- We kicked off the **2022 Stewardship Campaign** in the past month with the following activities:



The bookstore at St. Mary's is a great source for truly meaningful gifts in all seasons, but especially for Christmas. Now is a good time to visit the newly remodeled

and conveniently organized bookstore to select gifts that nourish the spirit. For people stopping in for a quick browse, there are featured item displays including a "New and Noteworthy" section. You will find a large selection of icons and books and other gift ideas from which to choose. Gift certificates are also available.

During this season of grace, there are many icons of the Nativity and books available to enrich the Advent journey. Christmas ornaments and micro icons (1"-1 ½" in size) are popular gifts for friends and family.

With an abundance of books to choose from, two to highlight are

 101 Orthodox Saints by Presvytera Sarah Wright and Alexandra Schmalzbach, with illustrations by Nicholas Malara

This is a great book for people of all ages, even though the book is featured for children.

• Timeless Wisdom: Frescoes from the Community of St. John the Baptist (Essex, England)

This beautiful book is filled with icons of Saints and meaningful passages for prayerful meditation. In the introduction explaining this book, the community writes:

Saints were selected based on their ascetic writings, and each carries a scroll presenting their words on the general theme of "brotherly love." In the case of women monastics whose writings have not come down to us, their scrolls contain some representative aspect of their lives. (6)

If you are looking for a gift to be enjoyed around the house or in a dorm room, the bookstore has branched out and brought in some new items with designs by Ortho-

dox Christian artist Aaron Gray, including mugs and framed canvas prints. The mugs feature Saints with their powerful words of inspiration. They are microwaveable, dishwasher safe, and available in 11 oz. and 15 oz. sizes. The canvas prints feature words of faith and encouragement. They measure 8"x 8" x 1 ½" so they can be featured on a table or desk top—or be hung on a wall. Aaron explains that all his creations are "made with the prayer that [they] will bring the spirit, beauty and joy of the Orthodox Church out into the world and into the everyday lives of Orthodox Christians."

For parents and grandparents looking for a child's gift that can last for generations, we are delighted to offer hand-carved Orthodox Churches made of building blocks. We are grateful to Presvytera Alexandra for introducing us to Alex Goncharov, who lives in Canada and carves the churches from Canadian Red Western Cedar and Olive Wood harvested in Bethlehem. His labor of love began as a way to teach his daughter about Orthodoxy and all the parts of the Church. He makes two churches a week, at night, after his day work.
