A Message from Father Jason

Hey! Were you invited to the wedding???



Christ blesses the marriage in Cana
—Gospel of John 2:1-12

The summer months are sometimes referred to as the "wedding season." A quick perusal of a church bulletin or a sacrament logbook confirms the fact that May through September are the most common months couples choose to have weddings in Minnesota. We all have been invited to various weddings in our lives by friends and relatives.

The Orthodox Church, too, invites special friends and relatives to the wedding

service. Peppered throughout our Orthodox wedding service, many Saints, who were married and raised children together are mentioned in the wedding service. Many of the Old Testament saints like: Isaac and Rebecca, Jacob and Rachel, and Joseph and Asenath, Moses and Zipporah, are mentioned and celebrated. These saints stand as great examples of faith to our own families. They

were married. They raised children. They followed God.



Saint Procopios the Great Martyr

But wait...who is this Saint Procopios the Great Martyr mentioned at the end of the service? Hey! Were you invited to the wedding??? Saint Procopius was never married. He never preformed a marriage. He didn't even have a good example of a marriage from his own parents. What is he doing in the marriage service?

Saint Procopios is a martyr. He died for the Christian faith. He sacrificed himself. In a marriage, the couple is called to ultimate self-sacrifice for each other. In the Epistle reading during the wedding ceremony, we read, "Husbands,

love your wives, as Christ loved the church and gave himself up for her (Ephesians 5:25). Christ gave up His own life for us. Husbands are told to give themselves up for their wives. Self-sacrifice! Husbands are to die for their wives. Self-sacrifice is a central virtue in a Christian marriage. The couple is crowned in the wedding service, recalling the martyrs being crowned by God for their self-sacrifice. In light of this, it makes more sense that a great martyr of our Church is called upon during the marriage service. It is because of his example of self-sacrifice that Saint Procopios is invited to the wedding.

Just as we close the wedding service, let us also all pray:

Reflections on Grieving and Loss

Weeping may linger for the night, but joy comes with the morning.

—Psalm 30:5

- Loss shatters our accustomed ways of doing things. What we once took
 for granted, from habit, routine, or familiarity, now have to be accepted as
 dismantled, and new ways must be found to go forward.
- 2. Silence can harm us. This only makes us feel alone and alienated, as we look around us at the world that suddenly feels full of laughter and happiness. If we share with others, however, we soon see that suffering is woven into the human condition. We are not alone.
- 3. Despite the feelings of devastation and the absence of comfort, there is also a continuity of the presence of God, and thus solace, if we can open ourselves to His presence, which is often found in subtle and unlikely ways.
- 4. Resilience is fundamental for turning sorrow into acceptance. The searing pain of grief can lessen and be replaced with a growing sense of compassion not only for ourselves, but for the anguish of others.
- 5. You will oftentimes hear suffering called redemptive. But we should not be too quick to tell ourselves that the raw and brutal pain of loss had a purpose. We can not convert overnight to this insight. Clichés and quick fixes can leave us feeling not reconciled but guilty for our failings to measure up to unrealistic expectations.
- 6. Christ never promised us a life free of loss, grief or care. Even the body of our Resurrected Lord bore the mark of the nails by which he was crucified. He found the joy of resurrected life not because He did not suffer, but rather because He transfigured suffering.



The Three Pillars of Stewardship

Ownership, Engagement, and Generosity

Last month, we introduced the three pillars of Stewardship, as outlined in the new Metropolis of Chicago Stewardship Initiative, **Strengthen Stewardship Now and Forever**, and we outlined the concept of **Ownership**.

This month, we would like to touch on the concept of **Engagement**. Engagement has two components: activity and service.

Activity refers to our involvement in the life of the church, whether it be spiritual, educational, or social. Time spent praying at services, receiving the Eucharist, attending Bible study and retreats, and yes, even our time volunteering for a shift or two at the Greek Festival, is considered our "activity" within the church. This activity, or askesis, is certainly crucial to our spiritual growth, and to our achieving Theosis--the goal of our entire spiritual life.

Service to the church refers to our time and talent, which is used to serve others. Serving on and contributing to a committee (such as Parish Council), chanting, teaching in Church School, or working at FOCUS are considered the Time and Talent portion of our engagement.

To be true and responsible Stewards, we must commit ourselves—via the Time and Talent forms we receive every year—to become engaged in a life of service to the church. We encourage you to reflect on the special gifts God has blessed you with and consider how you could use these talents to help our parish flourish.

"You are the light of the world. A city that is set on a hill cannot be hidden. Nor do they light a lamp and put it under a basket, but on a lampstand, and it gives light to all who are in the house. Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works and glorify your Father in heaven."

-Matthew 5:13-16


As of June 6, 2022, we have covered 33% of this year's budget for ministries and operating expenses.




Stewardship Pledge Forms Completed 2020, 2021, and 2022



In the Bookstore

The Sunflower: Conforming the Will of Man to the Will of God could be described as a practical manual for living life in Christ. It could also be described as a commentary on Romans 8:28—"... God makes everything work together for good...." This book was written by Saint John Maximovitch (1651-1715),

Metropolitan of Tobolsk and all Siberia, who is known more commonly as the namesake and ancestor of Saint John of Shanghai and San Francisco.

Using the metaphor of the sunflower, Saint John writes:

The sunflower is a flower that constantly turns to the sun—morning, noon, and evening—not only during sunny days but also even during cloudy ones. The will of man should emulate the nature of this flower and turn to God and His divine will every hour, not only in the bright days of life but also during the dark, difficult days. The holiness of a person's life, according to a certain wise theologian, is the constant striving toward perfection for the duration of life, the gathering of all possible virtues together with God's will. Whatever is pleasing to God, let it be pleasing to you, O Christian. (146)

Divided into five parts with many chapters in each part, The Sunflower is a clarifying companion for seeking, knowing, and accepting the will of God. For example, in Part One the chapters are "Discerning the Will of God and Conforming to It," "Why does God Allow Evil?," "How to Recognize God's Will in His Inscrutable Judgments," "How to Determine God's Will in All Events and Actions," and "How God's Will Is Revealed in Jesus Christ, and How We Can Conform Ourselves to It." Saint John repeatedly emphasizes the inscrutability of God's will and the importance of accepting God's will no matter whether we understand it or not. One reminder the reader will find repeated in many iterations throughout the book is that God's perspective is not necessarily ours, and it is human pride that would think otherwise.

Saint John explains and encourages:

The only true means to acquire happiness in this life and the next is to constantly direct our attention within—to our conscience, thoughts, words, and deeds—and to weigh these things without partiality. This will reveal to us the depths of our delusion in life and will show us the only path to salvation. This path is the complete commitment of our being, together with all the circumstances of our individual life, to the will of God. Let the sunflower be our preferred symbol of this turning toward God. Let us keep the image of the sunflower always in our mind. (62)

In this season of summer when we see sunflowers blooming and in all seasons let us remember the example of the sunflower and pray: "As it pleases God, let it also please me." (63)

It is thanks to Mother Macrina that copies of *The Sun-flower: Conforming the Will of Man to the Will of God* are available in the bookstore. She has recommended this book to many people because of its vital importance. Anyone who reads it will understand why.
