Supply Shortages Affect Saint Mary's

We read in the Gospel accounts that Christ often stirred things up, making people question norms or think outside the box. St. Mary's finds itself in a similar situation as the news of supply chain concerns is reaching even our beloved parish.

Over the past few months, our office staff has struggled to find placemats, divided plates, compostable forks, to name just a few items. It is not uncommon to place an online order and then for half of the order to not be delivered due to items out of stock.

Please know we are working hard to have the needed supplies available, but encourage everyone to not only be patient, but also flexible. This exercise allows us to consider how much we may waste – taking a stack of napkins when they are not needed; using placemats when there may not be an urgent need; grabbing paper towels and storing them for use later – or how we approach activities, often just doing things as we always have.

Use this time, and these shortages, to challenge yourself and your ministries to continue to provide hospitality, even if traditional supplies utilized are not the same.

Festival Baking 2022



Repairability!

International Orthodox Christian Charities

IOCC. The meaning of these letters was unknown to us 10, maybe 15 years ago. (Time passes so quickly it's hard to keep up). Today we know these letters represent International Orthodox Christian Charities. They have U.S. and International operations.

IOCC is busy in the U.S. They have 2 trucks full of tools and 3 permanent staff to manage the budget, travel arrangements, payments and to coordinate where and what to work on. "What to work on" is a big question.

Typically, IOCC (U.S.) works on disaster (hurricanes, tornadoes, floods etc.) destroyed homes. We sometimes work in small groups of volunteers or provide on-site guidance to volunteers from a wide range of other groups such as Americore teams. It is hard dirty work. Not complex, just hard and dirty.

The typical starting point is someone's home that has become unlivable due to roof damage and subsequent water damage. Mold immediately invades the walls, cabinets, and possessions. It's not hard to understand how a person would feel when their home, in the course of one day, changes into a soggy unlivable mess.

So, why does anyone put up a hand, like a little kid and yell, "pick me! pick me!" for this kind of work, and naturally, anyone new to this work, as I was, has doubts about going into such an unknown situation for the first time?

Driving into the hurricane damaged neighborhood the 1st evening was an "eye opener." Blocks and blocks of roofs gone, blue tarps over roofs, "plywood" windows, walls gone, and trees down and closed businesses. (I saw an auto repair shop still working with no roof-what could be more fun than working with wet, greasy tools!) The storm suddenly and forcefully inundated these neighborhoods with a great deal of "unknown."

WHAT does one little person do?

The answer comes with the work. We restore houses to repairability. "Restored to repairability"?? An odd term. Odder yet, a veteran of disaster relief work said, "We get people unstuck". But it captures why you put up your hand.

IOCC, in the name of Dan Hoeft, is on site working with local disaster committees identifying and prioritizing our

workload. This is the work of sorting through neighborhoods house by house, person by person. It is the 1st step in restoring homes and lives, i.e., disaster relief.

Next, volunteers come (me, in this case) and work on homes. Some are still full of furniture, pictures and life's mementos; mostly wet and damaged. How many of us, alone, could empty out our house so it could be repaired, making decisions of what to keep or throw? These people are truly and honestly "stuck." Stuck with a home that can't be lived in, stuck with a pile of damaged memories, perhaps too painful to sort and throw. IOCC has people trained (and inherently adept) at helping with this painful work.

What does "restored to repairability" mean? For the house, it is removing any sheet rock (walls and ceilings) with mold or water damage. Insulation goes too, as do kitchen, and bathroom cabinets and furniture. It is all piled by the street and hauled off. Then all the nails and screws and anything else attached to the studs of the house are pulled out. All damaged flooring is pulled up. It is dirty, dusty work.

Now the home, opened as it is, can dry out. It is like walking into a new house under construction. The owner can imagine it completed. It is a hopeful, future looking home. New walls, ceilings and flooring will be installed, and, with the damaged material out of the way, much sooner and at less expense. **The house is repairable. The lives lived in this home are "unstuck"!**

How does a person feel after working "disaster relief"? Gratitude at being able to help. Joy at knowing people look at their homes and their lives and again see a future. Even though we left the homes in a state of emptiness and bare studs, the residents of each home expressed profound gratitude! Surely the thankfulness signaled the future they saw ahead! Unstuck!

If I may, let me challenge you, our readers. We all have "bucket lists." What do you want to put in yours? Stuff for "me" or the faces of people who can again see ahead?

Lastly, if you want to volunteer, the IOCC website gives information: ioccc.org/takeaction. If not, the web site will also show many other ways to help with IOCC U.S. Operations. The people "on site" are at the end of a long line of support for which we are all very thankful!

Christ is Risen! Truly He is Risen!

As many of you know, the Metropolis of Chicago has been busy formulating and enacting a multi-year Strategic Plan for numerous departments and ministries. The Strategic Plan for Stewardship is in one of the most advanced stages of development and has been designated the "Strengthen Stewardship Now and Forever" initiative. A Metropolis-wide team has been working diligently for two years and has formulated wonderful ideas and materials to be used in Metropolis parishes.

Three pillars form the basis of Strengthen Stewardship Now and Forever and will help us on our path to responsible Christianity:

- **Ownership**
- **Engagement**
- **Generosity**

Over the next three months, we will highlight each of these three pillars of Stewardship - this month we will focus on **Ownership**.

On a parish-wide scale, *Ownership* entails ensuring vibrant parish leadership and a strong, diverse Stewardship Committee. On a personal scale, it involves each parishioner or family unit making a personal commitment to Christ and His Church by completing yearly time and talent form, along with a financial pledge form. This commitment reminds us, and shows Christ, the seriousness and significance of our love and devotion to the Church, and the act of pledging ourselves formally is a very important aspect of our spiritual journey.

Of course, during a given year, many "surprises" arise in our lives, and whether we are able to fulfill our time, talent and treasure pledge is not as significant as if we actually make one.

On any given year, less than 50% of St. Mary's parishioners complete time/talent and financial pledge forms. While many donate of their time, talent, and treasure (some very, very generously), the act of ALL of our parishioners completing pledge forms remains the goal of parish leadership and the Stewardship Committee.

Why is it important to fill out these forms, even if you are giving regularly of your time, talent, and treasure

anyway? While this represents a more urgent change in messaging for St. Mary's, completing these forms in a timely manner each year will demonstrate our unwavering commitment to and ownership of our personal faith journey. And in doing so, we will not only enhance our own spiritual lives (most importantly) but 1) will show us to be a beacon of light within the entire Metropolis and 2) will help us at the parish level for budgeting purposes.

Ways to Complete Time/Talent/Treasure Forms

- 1) On paper: via the annual Stewardship packet you received last December
- 2) Through our office: Call or stop in to request a new form if you have lost yours or fill one out (confidentially) over the phone.
- 3) On-line: Fill out the form on-line on the Church website.

Ways to Give On-Line

- 1) On-line: This is very important! There are two options on-line:
 - a. Make a one-time payment as often as you would like.
 - b. Set up recurring payments on-line, through your bank. If you choose this option, PLEASE ALSO FILL OUT Time/Talent/Treasure forms, on-line or on paper.
- 2) Venmo: this is a new and exciting way to give to St. Mary's!
 - a. Visit our website directly to access Venmo information.
 - b. Scan the QR code in the Messenger or bulletin to access a link to our Venmo.
 - c. Remember, even if you give regularly via Venmo, please fill out a Time/Talent/Treasure form for our records!

We are excited to continue to bring new ideas and new technology to St. Mary's and to further our discussions on Engagement and Generosity in the coming months.


Stewardship Campaign 2022 Update

Thank you for your participation in our 2022 Stewardship Campaign and your on-going support of St. Mary's through your gifts of time, talent, and treasure. The goal this year is to cover all the Church ministries and operating costs through Stewardship contributions without relying on rental and festival income to cover the gap. **As of May 2, 2022, we have covered 25% of this year's budget for ministries and operating expenses.**

On the next page are two bar charts showing total number of Stewardship financial commitment forms completed in 2020 and 2021 compared to the total completed in 2022 year-to-date as well as the total dollar amounts pledged for each year. The number of financial commitment forms completed, as well as the dollar amount of financial commitments, decreased from 2020 to 2021. The year-to-date total for 2022 is less than 2020 and 2021 but it is still early in the year. We did receive six completed forms during the past month.


Although St. Mary's is blessed to have many people who donate their time, talent, and treasure, less than half commit themselves to complete time, talent and treasure forms each year.

For Saint Nikolai of Ohrid, a.k.a. Saint Nikolai Velimirovic (1880-1956), Lake Ohrid was a beautiful place. While at Lake Ohrid in 1921-1922, he wrote prayers that were soon published as *Prayers by the Lake*. A modern spiritual classic, this book has been hard to find for several years until it was recently republished.

In 1919, Saint Nikolai was consecrated Bishop of Zica in the Church of Serbia, and in 1920 he was posted to the Ohrid archbishopric in Macedonia. Reading the prayers in this book it is evident that time at Lake Ohrid was clarifying, focusing, and life giving for him. One could say that Lake Ohrid was a thin place for Saint Nikolai, meaning that the veil between heaven and earth was transparent for him when he was at this lake. The prayers he wrote clearly reflect this. He saw elements of nature to be teachers pointing to divine realities. In his introduction for the first edition of this book in 1922, Saint Justin Popovic wrote about Saint Nicolai:



He thinks through prayer, he philosophizes through prayer. One senses that the luminous souls of the great Orthodox ascetics...are speaking through him. Through prayer he senses God, and through prayer he senses all creation. He is in a prayerful relationship with everything. (11)

For example, mountains and the foam on the lake—

The walls that stand between you and truth and loom up before you like colossal mountains, which you have been trying to cross by running to the point of exhaustion, are your own creation and are more fragile than the white foam on the lake. If only you could open your eyes wide enough not to see them. Truly, the existence of these walls depends upon your seeing them. If you did not wish to see them, they would not exist. (124-125)

Sebastian Press has published a beautiful new edition of *Prayers by the Lake*, edited and with illustrations by Bishop Maxim Vasiljevic. Todor Mika and Stevan Scott translated the text with great respect for Saint Nikolai's poetic thinking and writing. The book design and printing were done in Serbia—a fitting tribute to a beloved Serbian Archbishop and Saint—with remarkable attention to detail, including a sewn binding for long use, a subtle wave pattern in the background on each page, and three photos of Lake Ohrid—two of which feature Saint Nikolai on the lake.

Whether you are walking around Bde Maka Ska or spending time at a cabin on a lake—wherever your beautiful place is—*Prayers by the Lake* is a companion to elevate your journey and provide a lens through which to see in the natural world around you signs of God in His grace.
