



Participate in Retreats and Pilgrimages

Many Orthodox communities organize retreats and pilgrimages during the summer months. These gatherings provide a unique chance to step away from our daily routines and engage in communal worship, spiritual reflection, and fellowship. Seek out local monasteries, parishes, or Orthodox organizations offering retreats or organize your own spiritual getaway with fellow believers. For example, The Liturgical Arts Academy located at the Diakonia Retreat Center in Salem, South Carolina, offers workshops focused on icon creation and chanting in the late summer months. Regardless of whether it is a weeklong retreat, a day trip to a sacred site tacked on to a vacation, or an extended pilgrimage to a distant holy place, such journeys can profoundly impact our spiritual growth.

Practice Vigilance in Worship

While the summer months may bring changes to our regular schedules, let us remain vigilant in our commitment to worship. Attend Divine Liturgy faithfully, participate in the sacraments, and observe the fasts prescribed by our Church. Even when traveling, strive to find an Orthodox parish or monastery where you can join in the Eucharistic celebration and connect with the local Orthodox community. Consistency in our worship nurtures our relationship with God and strengthens our bond with the Body of Christ.

Serve Others with Love

Summer is a season of abundance, and as Christians, we are called to share our blessings with those in need. Look for opportunities to serve others through acts of charity, kindness, and compassion. Volunteer at local food shelves, homeless shelters, or community outreach programs. While there is certainly a need to engage in initiatives that support those who are vulnerable members of society, there are other ways to serve as well. This can be as simple as hosting a meal or a cookout at our home for someone who we haven't seen in awhile or someone who is in need of company. 


New Philoptochos Board




Are You a "Realm" User?

In the Bookstore

Father Michael Shanbour has drawn on his experiences as a parish youth director and his many years as an Orthodox priest, to write The Good Samaritan: A Children's Catechism.

While it is listed by the publisher as being a book for children ages 6 to 12, Father Michael notes in his Preface:

This work was written with preteen children in mind. Having said this, experience shows that this catechism may also serve as a basic primer for Orthodox Christian teens and adults or even those inquiring into the Faith, as it effectively introduces many of the fundamental truths of Orthodox Christianity necessary for anyone, young or not so young, who desire to know God and His Church. (i)

Explaining the foundation for this catechism and how the book proceeds, he writes:

The title, **The Good Samaritan**, is inspired by St. John Chrysostom and other Church Fathers who, in addition to the more common moral interpretation of showing Christlike compassion for those in need, have interpreted this parable of the Lord (Luke 10:30-35) as an icon or analogy of the entire economy of salvation. Through this lens we can perceive the Church for what She is—the "spiritual hospital" for the healing of the sickness of sin—and the place where we receive the true "medicine," Jesus Christ, through her sacramental, ascetical, and hesychastic Tradition.

In this catechism we are taken from life in Paradise, through the fall of Adam and the reality of sin and corruption, and into life and redemption through Jesus Christ. In the Church we then encounter Holy Tradition, the dynamic "river" that runs through the midst of the Church and provides the "living water" for our thirsty souls. The treasure of Holy Tradition then presents to us the Holy Mysteries of the priesthood, the Eucharist, and baptism, along with repentance and Holy Confession, all of which are essential for the health and salvation of our souls.

Finally, prayer, fasting, and almsgiving are shown to be the indispensable means of union with God and as lifegiving manifestations of faith, hope, and love. (ii)

With this map of the layout of the book, readers and listeners are guided with clear and engaging stories, relevant analogies, and patristic wisdom presented for modern readers. Father Michael includes simple ideas and activities to help young people "see" and remember what they are hearing or reading. For example, in the chapter describing how Jesus became Man to heal our sick nature and is the medicine for our sins, he uses the example of a sponge soaking up water:

This is something like what our Lord Jesus did on the Cross. He absorbed our sins like a sponge into His pure and sinless body and soul because of His love for us. He was the only one who could soak up our sins because He alone is without sin....All of our sins are like a tiny drop to Him. He then drained all of that sin—our sin—out of His humanity and into the sea of His love so that we could be free from sin if we live in Him. (35-36)

Father Michael also offers opportunities for readers and listeners to grow in their faith. In the chapter on prayer he writes:

Have you heard of the Jesus Prayer? "Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy on me." Can you memorize this prayer? This simple prayer can be with us at any time—at home, at school, at church, when we're playing, when we're alone, when we're with friends.

Saying the Jesus Prayer is like walking through a field in the same place every day. What happens if you walk over weeds and brush over and over? You clear a path, a road, right? If we use the Jesus Prayer a lot, we make a path in our heart that keeps us always with God.

And this is the goal of prayer: To always be with God, our Best Friend. (88-89)

The Good Samaritan: A Children's Catechism is an excellent book for children to read alone, families to read—and discuss—together, church school, homeschool, and anyone seeking a clear and simply presented catechism of the Church. Nicholas Malara illustrated the book beautifully so this catechism is not only presented in words but also in pictures.

"As Christians it is also important to value the time we spend at church, in worship, service and activities. Every member of the Body of Christ plays a role, according to their gifts, in the life of the local church. The church is not a social club, but rather a place where people of faith gather for worship, fellowship and service.

Most importantly, we gather together in worship, praising and thanking God for the blessings in our lives and hearing His Word. Of the 168 hours in every week with which we have been blessed, we offer back the short time we spend in church on Sunday morning, gathered together as the Body of Christ. We are united in prayer and united in Holy Communion. We become his hands and feet carrying out His work in the world. As we offer ourselves and our time as His Church, we are part of something much bigger than we can imagine - much bigger than the project we support, the service we provide, the prayer we offer.

In the Gospel of Luke we read of the man who planned a great feast and invited many people. When it was time to serve the dinner, they were all too busy - one with his farm, one with his bride, another with

his oxen. We can become so busy making a living that we forget to make a life. God gets crowded out of our lives over the most unimportant things.

At the first Christmas when Jesus was born. there was no room at the inn. And today we still have no room for Jesus. We crowd Him out with so many things.

In The Screwtape Letters, C.S. Lewis shows how the devil captures us, not by preventing encounters with God, but by whispering in our ear that we are "just too busy right now. We'll get to that soon. But just not right now."

Just as we budget our financial resources to reflect our priorities, we can re-set our allocation of time. We are all busy, but not all of that busy time is wellspent. We may need to say no to certain demands on our time, opening our schedule to God's prompting. We can live each day anticipating the opportunities he places in our path to offer our gift of time."


St. Mary's 2023 Stewardship Campaign Update

OWNERSHIP, ENGAGEMENT, GENEROSITY

Thank you for your participation in our 2023 Stewardship Campaign and your on-going support of St. Mary's through your gifts of time, talent, and treasure.

As of June 12, we have received **\$540,415** in Stewardship Income payments.

- This represents only 41% of this year's budget for ministries and operating expenses and is ahead compared to where we were last year at this time.
- An additional \$795,985 is needed by year-end to cover all our costs.


