# "All true beauty draws the soul towards you in powerful invocation, and makes it sing triumphantly: Alleluia!"

-Akathist of Thanksgiving, Kontakion 7

In 987, Prince Vladimir of Kiev is said to have sent emissaries to different countries to learn about the religion and worship of each. He was searching for an appropriate faith for his people.

The emissaries visited several nations and experienced the worship of a number of world religions, all without much attachment and sense of beauty. Finally the group arrived in Constantinople, where they were taken to Hagia Sophia (Άγία Σοφία), the cathedral church of the capital. Their report was this: "We knew not whether we were in heaven or on earth. For on earth there is no such splendor or such beauty, and we are at a loss how to describe it. We know only that God dwells there among men, and their service is fairer than the ceremonies of other nations. For we cannot forget that beauty."

The purpose of Orthodox liturgical music is to uplift the prayers of Orthodox faithful and to have a worship experience that transports us to the Kingdom of Heaven. In Hagia Sophia during the height of the

Byzantine Empire is the origin and purest form of Byzantine Chant. From ancient Byzantium, the chant has developed significantly, though it still shares the same roots.

Byzantine Chant even has its own notation and style of sheet music! Unlike staff notation that we all learned in grade school, Byzantine notation is relative, meaning the sheet music gives the chanter a starting pitch and "instructions" on how many pitches to ascend or descend from the homebase note. For example in western music terms, if the hymn starts on C and the next note is E, the Byzantine music would have a symbol telling the chanter to ascend two notes.

Have you ever heard someone say "first mode" or "that's in fourth mode?" That is because Byzantine Chant is made of a system of 8 modes, each one having a different sound and melodic movements. Having a variety of modes is used to communicate different emotions in the hymnology. Some modes communicate a triumphant sound, while some communicate a somber, repentant tone. Ultimately, the purpose of all of this is to glorify Christ and worship Him with the best that our voices can offer!

Chanting the divine services at St. Mary's is a true joy and I am thankful to be with you all!




Saint Mary's volunteers in the Simpson House kitchen after the May meal!

## In the Bookstore

In **On Christian Ethics** we are given a book written by Saint Basil the Great (329/330-379) that is certainly as relevant now as it was when he wrote it (ca. 360)—and perhaps needed even more today.

On Christian Ethics is one of the Popular Patristic Series from St. Vladimir's Seminary Press and is therefore intentionally reader friendly.

The translator, Jacob N. Van Sickle, provides a helpful introduction to Saint Basil and his life, in addition to explaining the context and content of this book and how it came to be written, to prepare the reader for greater understanding and appreciation of the actual text. This book consists of three sections: On the Judgment of God, On the Faith, and Ethics. Each section stands alone and yet also builds with the others into a cohesive whole. On the Judgment of God and On the Faith could also be described as two prefaces to Ethics. The translator writes:

In **On the Judgment of God** Basil emphasized the importance of looking to Scripture as the foundation upon which to build one's thinking. In **On the Faith**, he develops and nuances that assertion. The Scriptures are the firm foundation of the faith, and all our theology must be rooted in them; however, they do not answer every question explicitly...Thus it requires the careful use ofreason to faithfully apply the Scriptures to each question as it arises. (22)

One of the specific concerns St. Basil addresses is people trying to compromise the guidance and guidelines God makes clear in His Word. Self justification is shown to be the sin that it is in the judgment of God. The translator explains:

The thesis of **On the Judgment of God** is that the theological turmoil of his day is the result of the great number of supposed Christians, and especially Christian leaders, who elect to conduct their lives not according to Scripture but according to their own pleasure and reasoning....The pestilence ravaging the Church is fundamentally the rampant moral failure of disobedience to God's Word....The solution to the Church's problems is a return to Scripture as the norm governing Christian conduct. (18-19)

**Ethics** is a spiritual goldmine of guidance for people seeking to live a true and authentic Christian life. St Basil writes at the end of **On the Faith**:

We should now hasten to fulfill in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ our promise of the **Ethics**. And so, as many things as we find forbidden or approved scattered throughout the New Testament we have eagerly gathered, as we were able, into concise rules for the easy digestion of the willing. We provided each rule also with the number of the scriptural passages summarized in it...so that the reader...might take up the Scripture itself, look up the passage of the given number, and find the testimony with which the rule was fashioned...and...learn for himself the harmony of all the God-breathed Scriptures....Therefore I determined it likewise sufficient to furnish not every possible passage in the New Testament, but a few of the many. (87.89)

The immediate target concern for St. Basil writing on God's judgment, faith, and ethics, was the insidious and often rampant and aggressive heresies related to the church of and in his day. What he wrote was clear and prophetic and therefore relevant not only in the Church but also far beyond in the world at large, both then and now. Its timeliness is timeless.

I exhort and beg you: put an end to fastidious examination and unseemly polemic, and be satisfied with the words of the saints and of the Lord himself, and have a mind worthy of the heavenly calling. Conduct your affairs in a manner worthy of the Gospel of Christ in the hope of eternal life and of the heavenly kingdom prepared for all who keep the commandments of the God and Father, which are according to the Gospel of the blessed God Jesus Christ our Lord in the Holy Spirit and truth.

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ.

So let each one give as he purposes in his heart, not grudgingly or of necessity; for God loves a cheerful giver. —2 Corinthians 9:7

On recommendation from the Stewardship Committee and after discussion and deliberation in the Parish Council we have decided that it is time for our parish to eliminate the collection of funds through the passing of trays. Even though this action has been recognized as a staple experience of a church service and it creates a sense of immediate satisfaction, it also creates fears and in some cases anxiety for some parishioners and seekers. 
