

Entering the Season of the Triodion: Preparing for Great Lent

This March, we are once again invited into a profound journey of spiritual renewal through Great Lent. This sacred time of fasting, prayer, and almsgiving is preceded by a three-week preparation designed to transition and guide us into a time where the depths of repentance and humility are experienced. During this time, the Church presents us with a rich tapestry of hymns, Gospel readings, and theological themes to prepare our minds and hearts for the Great Fast. Let us explore the significance of this preparatory period and its key Sundays, as well as the spiritual disciplines introduced through Meatfare and Cheesefare weeks.

The Sundays of the Triodion

This preparatory period of the Triodion, has come to refer to the Sundays before the start of Great Lent, but it actually encompasses the weeks prior to lent and lasts until Holy Saturday (70 days, or 10 weeks). This is because **Triodion** is the name of the liturgical book that is used during this time. The word literally means "three odes" in Greek and refers to the hymns that are sung during the Orthros services of this period. The period of the Triodion begins with four Sundays, each offering a unique spiritual lesson to shape our hearts and minds for the Lenten season:

Coffee Hour Hosts Needed



The Sunday of the Publican and the Pharisee **February 9**

This Sunday introduces the central theme of humility. In the parable (Luke 18:10-14), the Pharisee boasts of his religious observances, while the Publican humbly confesses his sins, praying, "God, be merciful to me, a sinner." The Church teaches us that true righteousness is found in humility and repentance, not in self-righteousness or pride. This lesson sets the tone for the Lenten journey, reminding us to approach God with contrite hearts.



The Sunday of the Prodigal Son February 16

The parable of the Prodigal Son (Luke 15:11-32) presents the theme of repentance and God's boundless mercy. The younger son's return to his father after a life of sin is a powerful image of our return to God through repentance. This Sunday assures us that no matter how far we stray, God awaits us with open arms, ready to forgive and restore us to His grace.

Judgment Sunday (Meatfare Sunday) February 23

On this day, the Gospel reading (Matthew 25:31-46) shifts our focus to the Final Judgment, emphasizing acts of love and mercy. Christ teaches that our salvation is intertwined with how we treat others, particularly "the least of these"—the hungry, the thirsty, the stranger, the sick, and the imprisoned. This reminder encourages us to practice tangible acts of charity and compassion as part of our preparation for Lent.

Forgiveness Sunday (Cheesefare Sunday) March 2

The final Sunday before Great Lent is dedicated to forgiveness. The Gospel reading (Matthew 6:14-21) exhorts us to forgive others so that God may forgive us. The Vespers of Forgiveness, held on this evening, is a moving service where the faithful seek and extend forgiveness to one another, symbolizing the mutual love and reconciliation necessary for our spiritual journey.

The Discipline of Preparation: Meatfare and Cheesefare Weeks

In addition to the spiritual themes of the Sundays, the Triodion introduces us to the physical discipline of fasting incrementally:

Meatfare Week

This is the last week when meat is permitted before Lent begins. It helps us transition from our regular eating habits to the stricter fasting of Lent. Meatfare Sunday, also known as the Sunday of the Last Judgment, reminds us to focus on eternal priorities and detach from earthly excesses.

Cheesefare Week

During this week, dairy products are allowed, but meat is no longer consumed. This gradual step helps us ease into the full Lenten fast. Cheesefare Sunday is a time to reflect on forgiveness and to prepare our bodies and spirits for the rigorous fasting and prayer ahead.

Embracing the Journey

The period of the Triodion is not merely a prelude to Great Lent but a spiritual treasure in its own right. Through the themes of humility, repentance, mercy, and forgiveness, the Church calls us to align our lives more closely with the Gospel. The fasting practices of Meatfare and Cheesefare weeks allow us to transition into a different way of living through more deliberate discipline and prepare us to embrace the full Lenten fast with gratitude and reverence.

As we enter this sacred season, let us heed the wisdom of the Church, opening our hearts to transformation and renewal. May the prayers, hymns, and lessons of the Triodion guide us on our path to Pascha, the Feast of Feasts, where we celebrate the ultimate triumph of Christ's Resurrection and the fulfillment of God's Covenant with mankind.

In the Bookstore

Mother Theosemni is a book from The Holy Patriarchal and Stavropegic Monastery of Chrysopigi ("Golden Fountain") in Chania, Crete. It includes a brief biography of, testimonials about, and a collection of the words of the beloved Gerontissa of the monastery, Mother Theosemni.

Born in 1938 in Larissa, Greece, Mother Theosemni grew up there and was devoted to Christ and the Church from her youth. Her vocation to missionary service was evident early in her life. After graduating from the Red Cross Nursing Academy in Athens and working at various hospitals there, in 1966 she entered the Monastery of Saint Stephen in Meteora. The biographical note continues:

In 1976 she came to Chania along with two other sisters and, with the blessing of His Eminence Archbishop Irenaeus, she embarked on the restoration of the ruined Monastery of Chrysopigi. For twenty four years she worked silently with complete self-denial. Her spiritual presence and ascetic example inspired many young souls to devote themselves to the Bridegroom Christ and these souls she guided and formed in the Lord.

Ascetic, industrious and wise, the Gerontissa raised up from ruins and gave spiritual foundation to the Holy Monastery of Chrysopigi and its dependency the Holy Monastery of St Kyriaki.

Latterly, in her search for a more solitary environment for the community, she founded the Monastery of the Transfiguration on a high prominence above the Monastery of St Kyriaki.

During the years when she guided the community, Chrysopigi became a spiritual oasis for the town of Chania and the surrounding area. Gerontissa Theosemni was a source of light and hope, a staff and support for countless souls....People from near and far...all found peace and support in her wise words. All confided in her and found assurance in the presence of the peaceful and saintly Gerontissa who had the rare gift of combining a life of vigilance and prayer with missionary activity.

At the age of 48 she became very seriously ill with cancer and was miraculously healed through the prayers of the saintly Father Porphyrios (now Saint Porphyrios) who had a special love and regard for her. Her illness returned during the last four years of her life. She dealt with it with

great courage and steadfastness, with limitless patience and meekness and with a deep peace, carrying out her duties unfalteringly until her last breath....She fell sleep in the Lord on the 31st of May 2000 at the age of 62. (14-16)

Mother Theosemni was published one year after her passing. In the Introductory Note from Mother Theoxeni, who followed Mother Theosemni as the Abbess of the monastery, and the sisters in the community, they explain:

The major portion of this book comprises teachings of the blessed Gerontissa which were recorded during the last eighteen months of her life when, sensing that her end was near, she started to offer us more frequent words of guidance. (9)

Mother Theosemni's words of spiritual guidance are treasures to receive in one's mind and heart, words to be pondered with gratitude and growing awareness as their meaning is revealed and applied in one's life. Three examples from just one page in Mother Theosemni are:

*We should not expect things of others but rather always offer to them.

*It is a terrible thing to fritter away the gifts of the soul.
"If we love Christ and have Him within us, nothing else is required. (40)

Several testimonies about Mother Theosemni from people who knew her are included at the end of the book. They offer the reader insight into her person—a glimpse of her being—and her character. Professor Anestis Keselopoulos wrote:

She knew how to transfigure silence into peaceful words and words into eloquent and articulate silence. She taught more through her prayerful tranquility and the silence of her example. And even when on some occasion it was necessary to express her thoughts, every word she spoke possessed an authenticity because it was founded on her silence. (79)

Zoi Pliakou Nika keenly observed: "Acquaintance with her transformed the lives of those who came to know her as they strove to become better out of gratitude." (82) Such is the potential, too, for the attentive reader of Mother Theosemni.

Below is a beautiful testimony from one of our parishioners, Emily Skoutelas, who shared her message of Stewardship following the Liturgy on November 17, 2024

Every year, around the same time, I feel a rush of anxiety. It's that time of year when we start to sign up our kids for their extracurricular activities. I have a date, bolded in my calendar - 12PM. Winter sport sign-up. I wait at my computer, and as the clock changes from 11:59 to 12:00pm, I click in, eager to sign up our kids for various activities which should 'enrich them, round them out, and keep them moving with the pack.' Heaven forbid they be left behind.

As I pondered on what to speak about today, this idea, which I believe we all encounter in one way or another, of keeping up, looking the part, knowing the things, and having the skills. I thought about the often times heavy weight of the pressure we feel to do, say, and be involved in the right thing.

Social media is no help, as we sign on with bated breath to see what our friends and often times people we don't even know are saying we need. Are saying we MUST have. What second home did they buy, what new shoes did they get? What new company has employed them? The list is endless. I myself struggle greatly with this need to keep up appearances. Especially now that I'm a mom, I see it translates strongly into how I think my own children are perceived. What sports do they play? What arts can they master? It's a great and relentless pressure. However, it's pressure we willingly and eagerly take on daily.

This got me thinking about the concept of a second home. Admittedly, it's a dream my husband and I have! To buy another space, preferably on the water someday. We discuss, how can we plan for this luxury? How can we budget accordingly? Or perhaps it's our children's education future? What great school will they attend ", and how can we plan to make sure they can get there?

When I was a very new mom, John was maybe six months old, I met with a dear young Presbytera in Chicago. And seeing how the world was changing from when I was a child, I asked her, 'Presbytera - how are you able to keep your children in the church?' What she said to me really stuck. She told me that when your children walk into the building of the church and through the doors that enter into this sacred space of the sanctuary, they should feel like they are home. For all of us, too, but especially our children. They should walk through these doors and immediately relax, knowing they are surrounded in the best hospital, the best therapy room, and the best home they will ever know. This really stuck with me. Perry and I have tried to make it a goal for our children to feel this way.

In a world that is changing faster than we can keep up, I can already see the challenges our young kids will face. How we spend our time, energy and money speaks volumes to our kids.

The truth is, and I'm speaking from personal experience, the investments we make for ourselves and our children, often times doesn't make our church the priority. But when you think about it - the only thing that is guaranteed for any of us, is meeting Christ when he calls us home. No amount of baseball practice, ballet, skiing, new shoes or new homes, or new jobs could ever prepare us for this sacred meeting.

Truthfully, the ONLY valuable investment in our entire lives and in the lives of our children, is an investment in

our TRUE second home. Our church. This sacred space, this hospital where we come to receive sacraments, to worship, to meet our God, and to have fellowship with one another.

I have been very honored to now be employed by the church. I come in a few times a week, and although I've been attending church regularly my whole life, I never realized the amount of effort, time, sacrifice and love for Christ those who are employed by our church have. I see priests, deacons, administrative staff, youth, and volunteers who come together and work tirelessly to make our church a second home. This takes not only time and talent, it takes money, as well.

So I propose, that this year, we make a NEW date and time in our calendar. A date that will help serve as a reminder that in order to know our creator we have to come here. To this exact place. A reminder that here in this sanctuary, here in our second home is where we will meet Him. Here, in this spot is where we can prepare for that inevitable final meeting with our Lord. A reminder to make our beloved church a priority, knowing that it is the only investment we will ever make that will ever have any true valuable gains.






