



- Elected **Jeannie Possis** and **Andreas Hoeft** as our two Parish Delegates to upcoming Clergy-Laity conferences for the Chicago Metropolis. Their terms will run through 2026.
- Approved an anonymous donation of \$400,000 that follows the donor's wishes that the funds be used for capital projects to improve and repair St. Mary's.
- Approved a new programmable thermostat for the Nave that replaces the original system from 1956! The new system will allow Father Tim to control the Nave temperature from his iPhone and the office from their computer dashboard.



In the Bookstore

Father Alexander Elchaninov (1881-1934) was a man of deep faith in Christ. His faith and knowledge are evident on every page of **The Diary of A Russian Priest**, which is a collection of his writings compiled by his wife after his early death. Far more than just a diary, it contains "some of the notes that he made for his own use,

together with excerpts from his letters, several outlines for sermons, and a few thoughts jotted at random on scraps of paper found among his writings." (11)

Father Alexander brought a secular background into his priesthood and wove them together seamlessly in his life and writings. After studying history and philology at the University of St. Petersburg, he taught in the history department there while at the same time being involved in "the great cultural and religious ferment among the Russian intelligentsia." (12) He was described as being "the voice of conscience' to so many of those whom he encountered." (12) He then moved to Moscow and studied at the Theological Academy for a year until he was drafted into the army and served in the Caucasus. After completing his military service in 1908, he remained in the Caucasus, doing educational work in a private school, where he taught literature and psychology before becoming the principal of the school. Father Sergius Bulgakov (1871-1944), Father Alexander's older friend, teacher, and spiritual mentor noted, "Already, as a schoolmaster, Elchaninov was a true spiritual director, 'a priest even before his priesthood." (15)

The Bolshevik Regime came to power in the Caucasus in 1920, nationalizing the school and removing Father Alexander from his post as principal. In 1921 he emigrated to Nice, France, with his wife and baby daughter where he started doing agricultural work and taught Russian children who were studying in French schools. In addition, He gave lectures on a variety of topics to the Russian colony, and organized religious and philosophical discussion groups for the Russian youth. His house soon became a centre where many intellectual leaders of the emigration could be found, on a visit from Paris professors and writers such as Bulgakov...and many others. (16)

Then, Father Alexander writes:

I received a letter from Father Sergius B. (Bulgakov) in which he urgently advised me to enter the priesthood....l understood immediately that this was something irrevocable, that this was indeed my destiny....l scarcely hesitated—I went out to meet it, and then I felt an immense joy and clarity in my soul. Along the old path educating, lecturing—there was no longer anything to live for; along this new path, I feel revived and reborn. (17)

He became a priest in 1926. According to Father Sergius, "It was priesthood that revealed to the highest degree Father Alexander's interior strength and his power over human hearts." (18)

[His] interests were primarily moral, ascetic, and practical in character, rather than abstract and theological. His attention was centred on the human soul, on the application of Christianity to life. In his priestly work he concentrated especially on the work of hearing confessions and giving spiritual direction. 'Confession', Mother [now Saint] Maria (Skobtsova) has said, 'was his priesthood's essential calling.'

Another part of his priestly ministry that lay close to his heart was the task of preaching....his preaching was marked by clarity and conciseness. Each word was saturated with thought. (19)

Three examples of this in **The Diary of a Russian Priest** regarding the liturgical season of Lent are:

Lent strengthens the spirit of man. In Lent man goes out to meet the angels and the demons. (113)

I bid a sad farewell to the end of Lent. In Lent how much good is accomplished with greater ease, how much evil loses its power and fades away, what joy there is in observing those who pray, fast, approach the holy Chalice with devotion! However frequent the

disappointments and vexations during confession, however great the number of lazy, indifferent souls, blinded by sins and passions—there are yet many who possess a keenly sensitive conscience, who are merciless towards themselves, who love God and thirst for purification. Every confession is also a lesson and a spiritual gain for the priest who hears it. (112)

The ordinary year of a 'normal' Orthodox: a 'good' confession, a certain elation during half that day. The next day: he slips already, but stops and collects himself. An hour (or a day) later, he sins again. He recollects himself, but with less energy. And so one thing succeeds another, till he shrugs his shoulders and sinks into a hopeless callousness for the rest of the year, till Lent comes round again. Then he once more takes himself in hand, remembers the impending devotions, and so on. (115)

After Father Alexander's passing at the age of fiftythree, Saint Maria summed up his life's work:


In his earthly path among us, I would venture to claim, Father Alexander displayed the perfect fullness of humble Christian sanctity. After many years of brilliant educational work,...he attained to a wise, mature, humble, and simple priesthood. (22)

One sees in **The Diary of a Russian Priest** a man in Christ prayerfully pondering and processing his lived experience in the world. Father Alexander wrote perceptively and discerningly about faith, the Church, liturgy, human character, marriage, family life, children, education, and many other aspects of living as a Christian in the world.




