



Healing House Meal Leader and Volunteers Needed

Healing House Mother's and Children Program began in 2006. It serves up to 20 women and 24 children in a 7-18-month program. It is the only Christ-centered recovery program in Twin Cities that allows mothers to live with their children (the family shares one room) full time to heal together and create a new life through power of Jesus. St. Mary's has been involved with this program since its inception. Along with the school supply drive, AHEPA Children's Christmas Party (with presents) and every other month we serve and share a meal with the moms and children. While some volunteers play, read books, and color with the children we hold a Bible study for the moms. We have had a faithful group of volunteers for all these years, however, as circumstances change, it's become clear we need to enlarge our volunteer base. Dates are every other month on the third Saturday (except November). The time commitment is 5:00-7:30 p.m. Needs for the meal are shared among the volunteers and includes a main dish, salad/side, beverages, dessert, plus tableware. Children are welcome, the kids of HH love the company!

The time has come for a new leader for this precious ministry, our current leader, Erika Kensington, has moved to Missouri and is no longer able to serve in the ministry.

The requirements of the leader are:

- Notify volunteers via email and bulletins of upcoming dinners
- Keep roster of volunteers
- Verify with HH contact how many we will be serving
- Make sure all dinner needs are filled

Our next dinner/Bible study will be Saturday, January 17, 2026. We ask that you prayerfully consider sharing your light with these moms and children who've had the courage to seek help in the depth of their difficulties.





In the Bookstore

Two Hundred Chapters on Theology was written by Saint Maximus the Confessor (580-662). Saint Maximus lived a tumultuous life as a confessor of the true faith and proved to be an articulate witness, although sometimes difficult to readily understand. His life, especially his later life, was filled with conflict, all the while he lived the advice of Saint Athanasius to "Endure testing, persevere in toils." He suffered persecution, physical torture, and exile for his defense of the true faith against the heresies prominent in his day.

Saint Maximus wrote **Two Hundred Chapters on Theology** in the "chapters" genre, a form well known at the time. "Chapters" comes from the Greek word *kephalaia*, literally meaning "headings," or, in modern parlance, "thought bites." Each chapter "tends to be a short aphoristic phrase with a single theme for facility of memorization and recitation." (22) Writing in this genre is:

eclectic, dealing with wide-ranging topics often remotely organized around a unifying theme, to which each chapter contributes in a way appropriate to its conceptual content....As is characteristic of his work on the whole, certain topical threads are dropped at one point, only to be picked up at another, eventually weaving a complex tapestry. (23)

Luis Joshua Sales, the translator, wrote an introduction that is both helpful and edifying for the reader, including a section on the guiding ideas of and in **Two Hundred Chapters on Theology**. This is immensely helpful for the reader to appreciate the key themes Saint Maximus is writing about. These include Radical Divine Transcendence and Limitation of Creation; Uncreated-Created Distinction: Divine Simplicity, Cosmic Plurality; Cosmic Sabbath: Mystical Contemplations of Scripture and the Practical and Contemplative Life; Transformation and Presence: Seeing the Logos; Asceticism and Ascent: Virtues and Vices, Similarity and Dissimilarity to God; Deification and the Principle of Reciprocity; and The Dwelling Place of God. By sorting through these topics in the introduction, the reader is much better prepared to read the chapters. It should also be noted, perhaps emphasized, that "many chapters exhibit intentional ambiguities in order to speak meaningfully, within the same sentence, to those at different points in their spiritual journey." (from the back cover) "The reader is automatically the student listening to wise sayings of an elder, or, perhaps even a pilgrim seeking out the renowned ascetic and begging for "a word." (25) For example:

The Word of God both is called and is dew, and water, and fountain, and river, as it is written; to be clear, he both is and comes to be these things in accordance with the underlying

capacity of those receiving him. For to some he is dew, as an extinguisher of the burning desire and perpetration of the passions, externally hemming them in all over the body. To those burning in their innermost parts by the poison of wickedness he is water, not only as though destructive of what is harmful through an antidote, but also as a bestower of vivifying force for well-being. And fountain for those who have the character state of contemplation ever gushing forth, as the giver of wisdom. And a river to those who pour forth like a stream with the pious, right, and salvific teaching, as abundantly giving humans, cattle, beasts, and plants to drink, that also humans might be deified, being exalted by the contemplations of the things here said... (151)

Even though **Two Hundred Chapters on Theology** is not easy reading, the "chapters" or "thought bite" genre makes understanding much more accessible. This is a good book to read over an extended period of time, perhaps on a daily basis, to give one time to contemplate each chapter in a spacious manner.

Below is a beautiful testimony from one of our parishioners, **Cooper Buss**, who shared his message of Stewardship following the Liturgy on **November 9, 2025**

In the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

Brothers and Sisters in Christ,
When Declan grabs a toy away from Phoebe and yells “MINE”
I correct him.

“Declan, these aren’t your toys, they are OUR toys. Phoebe gets to play with them too.” Then I have to correct myself and I will say out loud “Actually, these are God’s toys. All of this is God’s. We get to take care of it. And that means sharing.”

All of this is God’s. Your own, from your own, we offer to you.

We are a bit obsessed with ownership. Our country is built on opportunity. And these opportunities tend to manifest in the form of accumulation. I think that if I really lived like I believed all of this was God’s, I would want less, I would give more, because I wouldn’t trust myself to care for so much! Money gives us security, right? The rich keep getting richer. Why? Turns out more is never enough.

Before the Fall, Adam and Eve lived in the garden. They had nothing. Naked. Their entire lives were spent in harmony with nature and God, as stewards, caring for the garden. Growing in their relationship with God.

What is the first thing Adam and Eve did after they ate the fruit? I over looked this my whole life. They made clothes for themselves. They took something they were supposed to be taking care of, and applied it for a purely personal purpose. Ironically, this is the first act of technology, they fashioned clothes for themselves. The first act after the fall was technology, acquisition, using nature for our own aims. Next time you find yourself spending too much time on your phone, read Genesis 3 (about the fall) and then take a good look at the apple logo.

Then in Genesis 4, another lesson on stewardship! Funny how we are teaching most of the kids in Sunday school about Genesis this year.

Cain and Abel. Adam and Eve’s sons. Cain brings an offering to God, some of his crops. Abel brings God the firstborn of his flock. Abel gives God the best, the firstborn of his flock. God respected this offering and did not respect Cain’s offering. Cain didn’t have the right relationship with his stuff, and it distanced his heart from God. We all know what happens next. Murder. Cain wanders far from God. Oddly enough, in their wandering, Cain and his descendants become technologists and city makers. They named their cities after themselves and they made tools out of metal. Interesting.

We don’t know anything else about Abel. I would have liked to model my life after him I think. He gave the firstborn of his flock of sheep. He sacrificed a lamb. Another lamb, the Lamb, was a first born too, begotten of the Father before all ages. The firstfruit of all firstfruits. That’s what God gives to us.

Every year, when Jess and I look ahead and decide what percent of our income we are going to give to the church, it is not an easy decision. This giving should be a spiritual act. The process of deciding what percent of our income to give needs to be prayerful.

Firstfruits are hard to give up. We have to decide what our firstfruits are. I’m talking about treasure, but there is time and talent too.

After Cain gave his leftovers, his face fell and he became angry.

Here is one thing I am sure of. When we give of our firstfruits, although it is difficult, we will have peace. You know that feeling you have walking out after Confession? Lightness, blessedness? Giving your firstfruits produces that too.

Ok, now it’s time to really sell it to you.

Being a steward means caring for what God has given us. Here is the church that we care for.

I was talking to a friend that helps with the youth group at a very healthy, thriving non orthodox church. They combine 6th through 12th graders. I asked if that gets chaotic. He said no, it’s typically 8-12 kids. The Sunday school class I teach is 7th and 8th graders. We average 8-12 kids a Sunday just in 7th and 8th grade.

This is the church we care for.

Stewardship

When people ask what church I go to, I ask them if they've ever seen a golden dome rising above the tree line on the east side of the lake. That's my church, St. Mary's. Our church is iconic. The gold dome on the lake.

This is the church we care for.

We are challenged and yet we stay united. COVID. Turmoil in South Minneapolis. We are attacked. Our hearts and our children. We are united in prayer, and sometimes, by God's grace He answers us with miracles.

I love this place. And I want as many other people as possible to love it too. I want to fill these blank places with icons. I want our golden dome to shine brightly across the city. I want every open place in our church to be filled with a person.

I don't know if you've noticed. The pews are filling. If you want a "good" spot, you have to get here early! Something is happening.


Let's keep making it happen.


