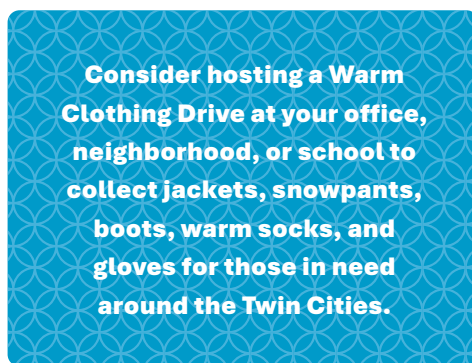

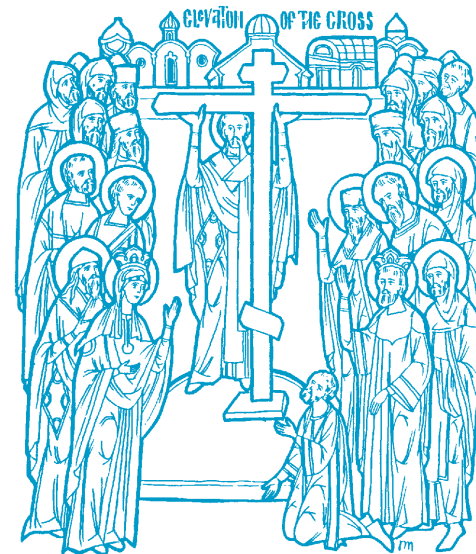

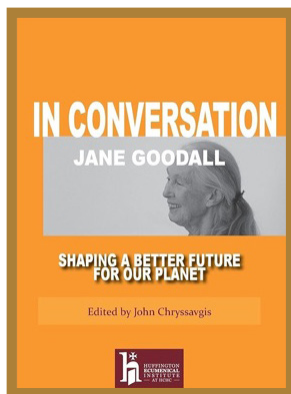

In the Bookstore

In 1989, Ecumenical Patriarch Demetrios established September first, the Ecclesiastical New Year, as the “Day of Protection for the Environment”—a day of gratitude to God for “the great gift of creation” and also of supplications for its preservation. All of September is recognized as being a month of prayer for creation.

Jane Goodall in Conversation: Shaping a Better Future for Our Planet is a book that shines light on the importance of all of God’s creation. This is the first

book sponsored by the Huffington Ecumenical Institute at Hellenic College Holy Cross School of Theology.* The conversation between Dr. Goodall and Father John Chrysavgis, the executive director, was the inaugural event of the institute on September 27, 2023. The seed for this event was planted in 2012, when Father John, on behalf of Patriarch Bartholomew, invited Dr. Goodall to attend the Halki Summit, where she met the Patriarch for the first time and spoke at the conference. They shared great, broad, and deep concern for the environment; and their friendship grew with time. She attended the Templeton Prize Ceremony honoring Patriarch Bartholomew on September 24, 2025, just seven days before she died.

Jane Goodall was born on April 3, 1934, in London. Her interest in animals and Africa started when she was a young child. At the age of 26, she began her research in the wilds of Africa, learning about and directly from chimpanzees. She was the first to observe a chimpanzee making tools with twigs to get termites in a mound. This revolutionized—eliminated!—one of the long held scientific definitions of humans as “Man: the Toolmaker.” For many years she continued her study of chimpanzees as well as her formal education. She also built up a small research station. In 1986 she was asked to help arrange a conference in Chicago that “brought together the seven other field groups studying chimpanzees in Africa and some scientists doing non-invasive research on chimpanzees in captivity.” (33) One of the sessions at the conference was on conservation during which the massive habitat destruction of the chimpanzees and their murder and abuse by humans was clearly documented. Dr. Goodall says:

I went (to the conference) as a scientist and left as an activist. I call it my Damascus moment as it reminds me of the change in St. Paul on his journey to Damascus. And since that day I have very seldom spent more than three weeks consecutively in one place.” (35-36)

For decades she has traveled all over the world “encouraging, educating, and inspiring people” (41) through the Jane Goodall Institute and the “Roots and Shoots” program she founded, established, and promoted, which is all about caring. She created this program in response to hearing the concerns and thoughts of young people in many countries that there was nothing they could do about the destruction of the environment. Each “Roots and Shoots” group chooses one to three areas of humanitarian and environmental concern and develops projects to help “make the world a better place.” (47) Dr. Goodall explains:

“Roots and Shoots” is flexible, so the projects chosen will vary depending on the age of the group, their environment, their socioeconomic status, their culture and their religion. We don’t

tell them what to do; they choose themselves. When you choose a project that you are passionate about, you will work with commitment and passion. And when you take action and make a difference, you no longer feel helpless and hopeless. (48) Its principal message, which is true for every one of us, is: “Every day that you spend on this planet, you make some kind of impact! And unless you’re living in extreme poverty, or are very young, then you can choose what kind of impact you make.” (47)

As of 2023, branches of “Roots and Shoots” are in 75 countries and every state in the United States.

Father John commends Dr. Goodall:

Your unique personality and your global work summarize the mission of the institute...—namely, discerning and determining ways in which people of all denominations and persuasions, as well as of all disciplines and goodwill, can work together to respect and protect the precious gift of God’s creation, both the planet and its people. (1-2)

I know you do not in principle promote your work as religious,...but you...have talked about your work in religious terms...as being nothing less than a mission. You have mentioned you feel you have a mission to accomplish, that you have been placed here on this earth for a reason, and that you can hardly find enough time to fulfil this work adequately. (2-3)

There is a sense in which your work transcends religion. That is what I would...describe as the ecumenical dimension. (9)

Dr. Goodall responds:

I love the fact that, in every major religion, there is the same golden rule: “Do unto others as you would have them do unto you” (Matthew 7:12). And if we include animals and the environment in with the “others”—what a beautiful world this would be! (9,11)

**Father John writes about the institute in his introduction to this book: The institute aims to address contemporary issues and social challenges facing our century and the world through ecumenical dialogue and theological scholarship. Accordingly, the institute’s objective is to facilitate and advance conversation and cooperation—particularly around theological and ethical, as well as pastoral and practical questions—by exploring and expressing the fundamental ethos of the Orthodox Church in open encounter and honest engagement with other confessions and religions, along with other academic institutions and scientific disciplines. This is how we at the Huffington Ecumenical Institute, perceive the heart and pulse of ecumenical relations. (v-vi)*

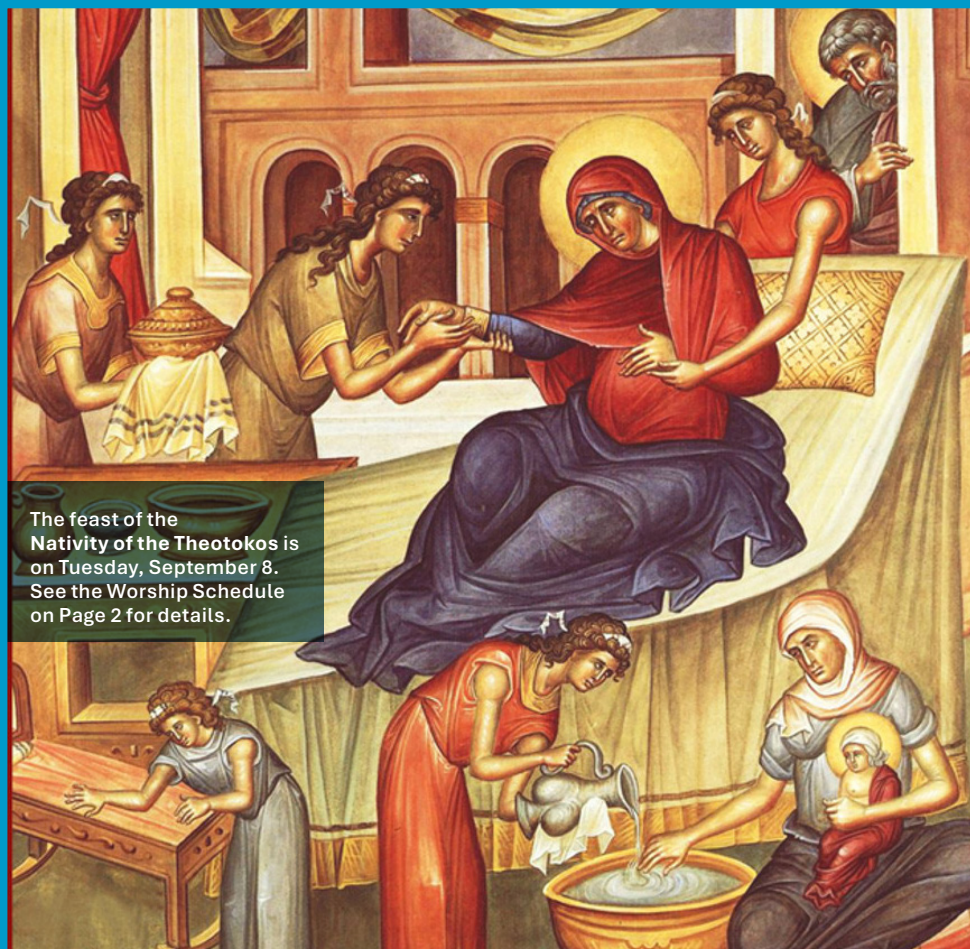

With Guest Speaker: Fr. David Hyatt

The Rev. Fr. David Hyatt is the pastor of St. Michael's Antiochian Orthodox Church in Greensburg, Pennsylvania. He and Khouryee BethAnn have three sons who were born and raised in northern Minnesota where he served as a Baptist pastor for more than twelve years before converting to the Orthodox

Church at Twelve Holy Apostles Greek Orthodox Church under the guidance of Fr. Timothy Sas. After moving to Pennsylvania in 2017, their family joined an Antiochian parish north of Philadelphia. While there, Fr. David worked as an assistant to the director of Saint Emmelia Ministries of the Department of Homeschooling of the Antiochian Archdiocese helping to organize homeschooling conferences across the country. He completed his Orthodox education through the Antiochian House of Studies and was subsequently ordained to the Holy Diaconate in 2020 and the Holy Priesthood in 2021. Fr. David has served as the assistant to His Grace Bp. THOMAS (Joseph), auxiliary bishop for the Diocese of the Mid-Atlantic, since 2019. Fr. David and Kh. BethAnn, and their three sons, moved to Greensburg, Pennsylvania in July 2023 to serve as the pastor of St. Michael's Antiochian Orthodox Church.
